DBA—Get Ready for Fall Workshops

ey, Pickers & Grinners! The summer is in full swing, but fall will be here before we know it! I'm sure you are all waiting for the temps to drop. We will be gearing up for workshops the week after Labor Day (September 13 & 14) so I thought I would take this opportunity to review what the workshops are all about.

Starting in mid-September, we will have two workshops a week. The Monday workshops are on the east side, Sept. 13 and 20 at the VFW and Sept. 27 at St. Francis in the Foothills

Church (River and Swan). These are newer locations; we lost Christ Community Church at the end of last year. August dates will continue as scheduled. The weekly Tuesday workshops start up Sept. 14 in Marana at Ora Mae Harn District Park community center. See the calendar for addresses and updates. This last year, as we all know, was hard on us all and keeping the association active was tough. We did keep workshops going with the assistance of "zoom," but we all know that's just not the same as playing with others in real time. Prior to "The Covid," 40-50 people were attending our Monday night workshop. Many players had been attending for a while and were developing their jam skills and even learning to sing and lead songs. This led to us splitting up the groups and putting those intermediate players in settings were they could advance their playing and skills in jamming. That is what makes bluegrass music such a special genre: you can go to a festival or jam and play with people you've never met before and even play songs you've never heard or attempted to play. This can also be intimidating sometimes. I feel what make our association so great is that our workshops get people to that level. I know I wouldn't be the musician I am today if I had not found the DBA and their workshops.

Unfortunately, we are unable to teach you how to play your instruments, but we do have many instructors and specific instrument workshops that can guide you with that; see page 14 for instructors. The purpose and concept of the workshop is to teach you jamming skills, and it's a place to work on your rhythm and learn "breaks" in a slower-paced atmosphere.

So, to get everyone ready for workshops, I have included some YouTube links I created (except fiddle, I'm not quite ready but am working on it, and I found a good one on chops) on what each instrument should be doing "rhythmically" during the vocals and while other instruments take their "breaks." These are just the basic ideas of "rhythm" playing and can be expanded on greatly. Also, there is a video on breaking down chord progressions and one on jam technique and etiquette.

You should use the workshops as a platform to practice new routines and become a strong rhythm player: 95% of the song you are playing rhythm and 5% of the song you are playing your break. We all want to sound good on our breaks cause that is where we shine and everyone is listening to you. But it seems that most players spend 95% of their practice time working on breaks and 5% of their time on rhythm. This should be transferred to more of a 50/50 split in your practice.

In September we will begin with Year 1 session 1 of Bill Monroe. I urge all levels of pickers to attend this first workshop Sept. 13 (check calendar for location). We will set up the format for beginners, intermediates, and advanced players. Also looking for leaders to help with all the levels.

Well, I'm off to the Hardtimes Bluegrass Festival this weekend in Hamilton, Montana. Looking forward to hearing great bands and utilizing my jamming skills I obtained over the years through the DBA workshops! AND, another great place to utilize your jamming skills will be the upcoming DBA Fall Camp-out at Lake Patagonia. See the next page for details!

A complete, portable sound system including: Amplifier, Mixer, EQ for each input and output, and two speaker cabinets. Each speaker cabinet has four 6.5-inch speakers. The entire system combines into a single assembly that can be carried to your next gig!

This system comes with the amplifier/mixer, power cable, a reprint of the owner's manual, and speaker cables. The sound system has 4 stereo channels with 8 inputs (4 XLR and 4 line inputs). It also has left and right RCA input jacks for inputs from CD and cassette players and operates on 115VAC power.

The 250-watt amplifier is in very nice condition, is fully functional, and is rated at 125 watts continuous duty each stereo channel.

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FIDDLER'S CORNER WoodSongs Coffehouse Tucson

There's an exciting new series of concerts coming to Tucson! Spanning a wide array of styles and intended to help musicians truly connect with each other and with their fans, these happenings will focus exclusively on acoustic music in an intimate setting with little or no amplification. They will provide a rare opportunity for fans to see and hear some of Tucson's great musicians up close, and for those musicians to come together, sometimes in their usual groups, sometimes solo, sometimes mixing it up to bring artists together in new combinations.

WoodSongs Tucson is the brainchild of Doug Bowers, a fine guitarist with eclectic tastes and a strong drive to bring back the kinds of musical experiences that made such a powerful impression on



him when he was young. His new musical experiment in Tucson was inspired by Michael Jonathon's popular radio program, WoodSongs Old-Time Radio Hour (https://www.woodsongs.com), "an all-volunteer, live audience celebration of grassroots music and the artists who make it." The program airs weekly on 537 radio stations world-

wide, and has featured an amazing array of artists, including Hank Williams, Bill Monroe, Béla Fleck, Sam Bush, Odetta, Joan Baez, Tommy Emmanuel, Judy Collins, Rhonda Vincent, J. D. Crowe, and our own Run Boy, Run.

WoodSongs Coffeehouse Tucson (https://woodsongscoffeehousetucson.godaddysites.com/ and https://www.facebook.com/woodsongstucson/) is patterned on '60s-style coffeehouses where artists performed their music in small, informal settings with audience members close enough to hear and see everything. Tucson's WoodSongs will be hosted by the 17th St. Music Club and housed in the

newly renovated event space, Site 17, where the old 17th St. Market used to be. WoodSongs will provide concerts for small audiences of fewer than 50 people, generally once or twice a month, and will feature a wide variety of acoustic musical styles. Doug refers to WoodSongs as "a venue with no menu" to emphasize that the focus will be entirely on the music. Although there may eventually be coffee and tea, one key aspect of this idea is to provide a place where artists and



their music are fully heard by their audiences without the distractions of food and conversation. There are too many places in this town where incredibly gifted musicians have become background music. WoodSongs is a strong effort to bring an intensely shared musical experience back to both musicians and audiences, with instruments and voices being heard as they actually sound.

While WoodSongs Coffeehouse Tucson is an all-volunteer organization, one of its important pillars is the idea that featured artists should be compensated fairly. The intent is to pay those musicians well with funds WoodSongs raises through donations and merchandise sales. In addition, all tips and any CD or merchandise sales by the artists go directly to them with no cut being taken. Some concerts will have a small admission charge, and that will go to the musicians as well.

An evening might kick off with a few numbers by the house band, followed by the night's featured

performers. In keeping with the informal atmosphere, musicians in the audience may be invited up to play a song or two, using one of the house instruments available on stage. Every session will be different, and will vary in style and tone according to the preferences of whoever happens to be playing that night. The hope is that performances will be so engaging and entertaining that both musicians and fans will want to come back and be a part of whatever's happening down the road.



WoodSongs Coffeehouse Tucson will launch with a soft-opening in August with concerts on the 17th and 31st by the house band, Hamilton Beech (Doug Bowers on guitar, Arlene Tomlinson on bass, Marshall Vest on banjo, and yours truly on fiddle). These invitation-only free concerts will give us an opportunity to introduce the WoodSongs concept and help spread the word to the broader Tucson musical community. WoodSongs is inviting the entire DBA, and space is limited, so please email me at <u>s.sommerer@icloud.com</u> if you'd like to attend.
