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It's time for our annual . . . Membership Renewal

Hi Bluegrass Fans,

It's time to review your DBA membership and to **renew your membership if needed**. In the Desert Bluegrass Association, we use a common yearly expiration date of March 1st. This allows us to focus on membership renewals once per year.

Of our 265 members, 159 of the memberships expire on March 1st. Your e-mail with this newsletter tells you if you need to renew. (If you receive hardcopy newsletters, we will enclose a note if you need to renew.)

You may renew either from our website or by mail. To renew from the website, go to www.desertbluegrass.org, look for the "Join Today!" area (below the banjo cactus guy), select your membership length, and click the "buy now" button. To renew by mail, print and fill out the form in the newsletter, enclose a check made out to DBA, then mail it to the address listed. Either way is simple and easy.

You can renew yearly for \$20 or for 3 years for \$50. The 3 year option has real benefits – you save \$10 and you only have to deal with renewals every 3 years.

The DBA promotes and preserves Bluegrass Music in so many ways. Think of the workshops, the jams, the festival, the website, the newsletter, the campout, the directory, and more. All of this happens because of two things: First, the hard work of incredible volunteers and second, your memberships which provide needed funds. So renew today and keep supporting Bluegrass Music in Southern Arizona.


mandolinist and songwriter with a gorgeous voice.

Band Bios

Mike Mitchell is a singer/songwriter and fiddler in the contemporary bluegrass style. With his effortless vocals, distinctive songwriting, and instrumental prowess, Mike continues to capture audiences and carve out his own place in bluegrass. He is most influenced by 70's J.D Crowe and The New South, Tony Rice, and Sam Bush. As a songwriter and recording artist, Mike has released 3 albums, the third of which, "Small Town" debuted on Billboard at # 2. His latest project, "Fathers & Sons" has enjoyed three chart-topping singles. The current one, "Making Hay," is on the Bluegrass Unlimited National Bluegrass



chart at #8! Mike is fortunate to record and perform with some of the world's finest and most accomplished musicians. Having cut records with the likes of Mark Schatz, Wyatt Rice, Sammy Shelor, Jarrod Walker and Jesse Brock, Mike knows how high the bar is set in top-level Bluegrass music, and strives to make it on every cut and at every show!

He is joined on stage by the following musicians:

Jacob Wright is an amazing banjo picker from Virginia who has spent the past five years playing with Larry Sparks and the Lonesome Ramblers.

Jeff Daugherty on mandolin was raised in a family of North Carolina pickers and singers. From a young age, he followed his uncle's band, New River Gospel, to festivals throughout the Southeast. Watching his family perform on the same bill as first- and second-generation bluegrass giants, he fell in love with the traditional bluegrass sound.

Jared Houseman is an adept bassist on both upright and electric. At the age of 9, Jared began gigging in the Bluegrass-rich region of Southwest Virginia, becoming a master of the style. His influences soon grew to include Jazz, Funk, Country, and everything in between, making him a versatile player on stage and in the studio.

Ethan Ratliff is an exciting up-and-coming Bluegrass guitarist. Just 21 years old, he began his musical journey when he first picked up a guitar only 5 years ago at age 16. Born and raised in the heart of Appalachia in Russell County, Virginia to a musical family, his pedigree is not unlike so many others who have kept this form of music alive and thriving by receiving it from the generation before and expanding upon it, taking it to new heights.



HillBilly Fever is a hard-driving traditional bluegrass band made of seasoned musicians with varied backgrounds.

Mark Krider, banjo. Mark has deep bluegrass roots from the North Carolina mountains where he grew up listening to and pickin' bluegrass. "You might say it's in the water there." Working hard to keep the traditional sound going, Mark formed HillBilly Fever. The band has performed from the east to the west coast. Mark has shared the stage with The Osborne Brothers, The Country Gentleman, The Lewis Family, and Blue Highway.

Randy Pasley, dobro, lead, tenor, baritone and bass. Randy's style of dobro playing is topnotch. He has performed with Doc Watson, Wyane Henderson, and Tim O'Bryant just to name a few. Randy also won first place dobro at The Galax Old TIME fiddlers convention. Randy and his wife reside in Ogden, Utah.

Tucker McCandless, lead singer and guitar player, plus he plays all the instruments well. Tucker comes to us from Pigeon Forge, Tennessee. Mark and Tucker have been making music off and on for the last 25 years. Tucker has such a great bluegrass voice – he's just a pleasure to listen to and he brings out that "High Lonesome sound." Tucker also performed at DollyWood for almost 10 years.

Hudson Bosworth, lead guitar and vocals. Hudson studied guitar with Wyatt Rice for four years at ETSU in Johnson City, Tennesee Hudson has developed into one of the best flat pickers around, and makes his home in Ogden, Utah along with his 1986 Santa Cruz guitar.

Billy Parker, mandolin, tenor, lead, and baritone vocals. Billy is known all over the west coast as "The Mandolin Man." Billy comes from the east coast and makes his home in Chandler, Arizona. Billy has been recording and playing bluegrass for many years. He is one of the very top performers you will get a chance to hear.

Alan Tompkins, bass, lead, baritone, and bass vocals. Alan is no stranger to bluegrass music. He promotes one the biggest bluegrass festivals in the central U.S. Alan and his wife and daughter live in Dallas, Texas.



Nick McBlaine and Logtrain are Nick Coventry,

Peter McLaughlin, Alvin Blaine and Evan Dain. For over a decade they have entertained Tucson audiences with their off-the-cuff bluegrass show, playing hundreds of songs and instrumentals and paying homage to the greats from Flatt and Scruggs to Tom T. Hall, Kenny Baker to Merle Haggard.

Every member takes their turn leading songs that vary from lightning fast banjo breakdowns to old time fiddle waltzes while lead singer Peter McLaughlin sings whatever he pleases, including his original songs like "Alice in Nogales" and "Desert Heart, Mountain Soul." The band brings so much experience and such a varied background to this eclectic show, they are sure to entertain all audiences.

The Storytellers is a prominent progressive bluegrass band that has established itself as a creative force in the Southern California Roots music scene. They draw from the rich canon of traditional bluegrass, country blues, old time and folk music as a basis for inspired improvisations and intrepid vocal harmonies.

The Old Pueblo Bluegrass Band (Old Pueblo Bluegrass)

has been delighting audiences with high-energy bluegrass music for a decade.

Bandleader **Reid Griffin**, on guitar, is a Tucson native. He has performed throughout the Southwest since the 1980s and toured Europe with his band "Griffin Brothers."

Steve Reed, upright bass, majored in music at Pima College, along with a long musical journey from classical to jazz and onward to bluegrass.

Bob Frankot, on fiddle, has been steeped in bluegrass all his life, and has played with the popular California bluegrass band "Hot off the Press" through the 1980s before coming to the Old Pueblo. All three members of Old Pueblo Bluegrass Band sing that blend for wonderful three-part harmony.

Cadillac Mountain has been performing Bluegrass music

all over Arizona for around twenty years. The current incarnation features Heather Hardy on fiddle and vocals, Katy Colville on bass, Alvin Blaine on banjo and dobro with Joel Leland on guitar and vocals and the addition of Hank Abbey on guitar and vocals. With great pickin' and tight harmonies, there is something for everyone to enjoy.

Hailing from Cape Elizabeth, Maine, **Joel Leland** and got the name of the band from the highest point on the eastern seaboard in Maine, Cadillac Mountain. It's the first place the sun touches the continental United States. Joel has been playing bluegrass guitar in the Tucson area for 20 years.

After moving to Tucson in 1990, **Heather Hardy** joined the Sam Taylor Band as a feature violin soloist, and soon became a vocalist. By 1996, Heather had formed her Lil' Mama band, taking it to New York in 1997, and in 2000, she was inducted into the Arizona Blues



Hall of Fame. She has been bringing her amazing style to Cadillac Mountain and putting the blues in Bluegrass for over 12 years.

Katy Colville joined the band on the upright bass after a long-standing stint gigging and touring with the Molehill Orchestra. Katy has been keeping everyone on time and smiling since 2002.

Alvin Blaine has been playing music across the country for decades and brings his unmatched style and virtuosity to every tune.

Hank Abbey came to Arizona's deserts from the Great Plains as a songwriter, vocalist, and guitarist. He combines his love of country music traditions of east and west with the high lonesome sound of Appalachia.

Monsoon Sky, formed late in 2022, is comprised of five musicians who have played with each other in various line-ups over the past decade. All are Desert Bluegrass Association (DBA) devotees who met during workshops or jams. They opened the 2023 DBA festival and will be performing at the upcoming festival in March.

Band members are **Dave Polston** (banjo), **Andy Bennett** (mandolin), **Brad Austin** (dobro), **Daniel Stolte** (guitar), and **Stephanie Austin** (bass).





The Notorious No-Gig Girl Band: With everything shut

down in 2020, The Notorious No-Gig Girl Band formed when four friends who had met at the Desert Bluegrass Association workshops decided to break COVID quarantine and jam outdoors in a city park. Spaced well apart from each other, the group played and sang for the pure joy of being together and making music. Playing every week in (nearly) all weather, they developed a following among park visitors, and were especially popular with the under-4 set.

Jennifer Johnson on bass brings raucous good humor and a strong beat. **Karen Dismachek** on guitar and fiddle lays down a mean groove. **Louise Courtney** plays an unusually soft-spoken banjo, but has been known to let her rip on occasion. **Suzette Sommerer** on

fiddle just plays whatever the heck she feels like. All four sing like angels (possibly angels with tarnished haloes), and their tight harmonies really bring the band together. Made up entirely of musicians who either took up their instruments late in life or who came late to bluegrass or both, they are a great example of how it is never too late to find passion for something new. Who ever thought that one day this group would be gigging? And no, they are not planning to change the name.

Ten Dollar Wedding: Born and raised in Arizona's vibrant bluegrass scene, Ten Dollar Wedding is a 5-piece band with a love of tradition and an eye toward the future. While the lineup (banjo, guitar, fiddle, mandolin, bass) and tight harmonies are something Bill Monroe might recognize, the band's original material and arrangements mark Ten Dollar Wedding as a thoroughly contemporary act.

Born in 2022, the band is rapidly gaining fans and recognition. Ten Dollar Wedding won the band contests at the Wickenburg Bluegrass Festival and



Grande Fiddle Championship. In 2023, the band played spirited sets at the Prescott Bluegrass Festival, Hassayampa Music Festival and the Wickenburg Bluegrass Festival, and brought a toe-tapping good time to bars and backyards across their home state.

Ten Dollar Wedding, continued

While the band is relatively new, the members of Ten Dollar Wedding are bluegrass veterans. Fiddle player **Mavis Enders**, guitarist **Chris Doyle**, and mandolin player **Brian Mariner** are mainstays at jams in Phoenix and northern Arizona. Banjo player **Patrick Brady** (Romen Buffalo) and bassist **Marc Oxborrow** (Haymarket Squares) have spent more than a decade in other bluegrass acts.

This experience and adventurous spirit is evident in a Ten Dollar Wedding set, where a heartfelt traditional number may be followed by an energetic original and a playful reworking of a pop tune. What's the connecting thread? Superb musicianship and the joy of hearing a band that loves playing together.



Alpine Divide Bluegrass: High energy, traditional and contemporary bluegrass, soulful ballads, tight harmonies and interesting originals is Alpine Divide Bluegrass. Having performed at festivals and other venues throughout the region, each member brings years of experience to the band. Each plays multiple instruments and sings, which adds versatility to the sound of the band.

Mark "Big Juke" Jukich on mandolin is a veteran of many bands back in his home state of Minnesota and his new home in Arizona. He recently placed third in the highly competitive, state mandolin championship in Wickenburg. Whether a song needs precision, speed, or tenderness, Mark knows just how to make each song special.

Jan Zale has been playing a driving bass, keeping the rhythm for multiple bands over the years. Whether a backyard jam or a festival stage, she keeps the music moving! She also enjoys lead and harmony vocals and has won several awards in specialty and harmony vocal and bluegrass band competitions over the years.

Galen Anderson is another veteran of bands in both Minnesota and Arizona. A prolific song writer, his original tunes have earned high accolades throughout the region. Playing guitar and singing both lead and harmony vocals is Galen's specialty. He has won several awards, including many blue ribbons in specialty and harmony vocals, bluegrass bands and specialty instrument competitions.

Howie Jorgenson describes himself as an "old retired veterinarian from North Dakota." We describe him as a multi-instrumentalist who plays bluegrass and clawhammer style banjo with precision. A lover of train songs, you'll hear his rendition of several with Alpine Divide.



Did You Know? Singer-promoter Carlton Haney and folklorist Ralph Rinzler have been widely credited as producing the **first-ever genuine bluegrass** festival, held in Fincastle, Virginia, on Labor Day Weekend in 1965. Performers included Bill Monroe singing with Carter Stanley; Red Smiley's band featuring a young David Grisman on mandolin; blind guitarist Doc Watson; multi-instrumentalist Don Reno, and many more. Some say, as rock and roll had emerged as the dominant genre in popular music, that this historic event "saved" bluegrass, It certainly kindled a lot of interest and imagination, and no doubt helped fuel the many new directions bluegrass music itself would follow over the ensuing decades. Footage from this momentous occasion can still be found on YouTube, with the search phrase *Fincastle bluegrass 1965*.

*Try playing this music fragment "Fast" and see if you can guess what it's from. It might have been played at that first bluegrass festival, though not on the instrument it's arranged for here. Give up? See answer after the Classifieds on page 20!
