The focus of the workshops will be geared to song repertoire and singing, and all bluegrass instruments are welcome. Maximum class size is 10 people and cost is \$50/person.



Freezing Friday at the Festival

AS Dave reported in his festival article, Friday started with a hold on setup until the rain finally let up, and ended with snow flurries mixed with rain. The temperature never rose above 62° F, was mostly in the 50s during the afternoon and evening festivities, with the dampness adding an extra frisson of chill. It was a test of the true dedication of our hardworking festival staff and the many wonderful folks who turned out to participate and to spectate.

This year's festival included a band contest for the first time in quite a while. It was open to any band playing acoustic instruments with 3-7 players other than those from bands we hired to play at this year's festival. We had eight bands participating, and they provided some great entertainment on Friday afternoon.

The weather did not cooperate – those who attended will remember that it was really cold, making it very difficult to play the instruments and to sing without shivering. Our long-suffering judges, Peter Rolland, Meryl Brown, and Billy Parker of Fresh Apples were incredibly patient, as they were freezing too. Nonetheless, they provided detailed scores and comments to the musicians who came out to play. These comments can be so helpful to bands as they strive to improve, and we very much appreciate our judges making the effort to be so thorough.

The scoring turned out to be more interesting than we had imagined. We provided fairly minimal guidance based on what we'd seen from other festivals' band contests – basically one score for each band made up of 30% material selection, 30% instrumental performance, 30% vocal performance, and 10% stage presence. Due to a more structured approach in fiddle contests, our judges arrived with their own score sheets divided into the four categories for each piece, so a total of 12 scores per band per judge. Total points for any band were the totals of all three judges' scores. As you can imagine, that was a lot of arithmetic that had to be performed and checked – sincere thanks to Doug McMaster who stepped in at the last moment and spent an hour with me tallying and double-checking scores!

Congratulations and thank you to all the bands that participated, and of course special thanks to all our judges. Your fortitude in carrying on despite the difficult conditions was impressive! The Old Pueblo Bluegrass Band (Reid Griffin, Bob Frankot, and Steve Reed) of Tucson took first place; the Dust Devils (David Van Gelder, Leslie Ritter, Mike O'Connor, and George Doty), also of Tucson, came in

second; and the MoonCats (Jordan Eslinger, Sky Froelich, and Danny Harildstad) of Pick City, North Dakota, took third.

Next up on the schedule was the everpopular band scramble. Each band, thrown together by random selection (i.e., names pulled out of buckets by instrument), was given about five

minutes to come up with a name and a couple of songs. Then they were thrust onto the stage to perform for the crowd. I am always amazed at how well these groups do, demonstrating that amazing ability of bluegrassers to create beautiful music without much preparation and no rehearsal. I'm particularly impressed with how well the more skilled musicians support their less experienced bandmates, and with the bravery that those with less experience show in getting up onstage and sharing their music. This year, the weather challenges had everyone bundled up and still shivering, but that didn't stop all these wonderful musicians from making us smile with their enthusiastic and remarkably beautiful songs. The scramble was judged by Dale Vickroy, Trish Beals, and Ky Burt. First prize was awarded to Cold Rain and Snow, second to Cold Feet, and third to Tucson Twisters. Thanks to everyone who participated and showed us once again what bluegrass is all about!

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Music Camps

Over the past few years I have been fortunate to attend several music camps. If you have the time and desire to explore a bit, I have some suggestions to consider.

Without a doubt, my absolute favorite music camp is the **Puget Sound Guitar Workshop**, which I have attended for eight years. This camp has been run for about 50 years, and now spans

four weeks in Port Orchard, Washington, in a beautiful, evergreen tree setting, along a nice, small, quiet lake. The organizers also run the California Music Camp, but I have only been to the camp in Port Orchard, WA. The WA camp is truly a joy and experience that is absolutely wonderful. It covers guitar, voice, music writing, stage presence, and sometimes bass and ukelele. One reason I enjoy this camp so much is that on the first day, all the teachers get up and discuss what they will be teaching and give a demonstration of what will be covered. We then have ample time after to



meet with them one-on-one and describe ourselves, our playing levels, our skills, and whether or not it is a good fit. There are two class sessions in the morning and one in the afternoon, making the decision tough! In contrast, I have been to multiple camps where the teachers have no agenda and ask on day one, "So, what do you want to learn?" Not here. This is educational, well designed, and well run.

I could go on and on about this, but to keep it brief, contact me if you would like to know more. They have about 15 teachers and about 120 "students" each week. Lodging: cabins and tenting. Website: https://www.pugetsoundguitarworkshop.org/camps




Voice Works, in Port Townsend, WA, is another great camp, and although I have attended only one time, it was fantastic. I thought it had been designed and run by the same people as PSGW... absolutely stellar! Again, the same first day teacher introduction, and they all had agendas for the week. Lodging: dorms.

NOTE: Both of these WA camps have transportation figured out from the SeaTac airport.

Fur Peace Ranch, located in Ohio, hosted an "On the Road" program one year in San Diego. They still do San Diego as well as the East Coast. This is run by Jorma Kaukonen, an amazing guitarist, once with the Jefferson Airplane. Spencer Bohren was my teacher, covering blues and, at the time, it was a bit over my head, but I have retained one song, which I still play! The teacher concert was phenomenal. About 40 students. Jenny Lester Hillbilly Choir is a 3-day vocal workshop preceding the Coombs Rodeo Grounds Bluegrass Festival, on Vancouver Island. She makes it fun, and it is easy to participate. I will be doing this again this summer, and let me tell you, the climate on Vancouver Island in mid summer is SO NICE . . . and, as many of you know, I need all the help I can get in this department! Camp Bluegrass, a long-time Tucson favorite, is located on a community college campus in Levelland, Texas. It is a weeklong event, with teachers in most, if not all, of the bluegrass instruments. There is a wonderful auditorium which hosts the teacher concert as well as a student concert later in the week. In the evenings, jams break out in the dorms in various locations, and in both years I have attended, I have always seen a nicely done "slow jam" for those just getting their feet wet. Lodging: dorm. Rocky Mountain Guitar Camp was held in Estes Park, CO, and I attended it one year. It included some well-known performers for sure, including John Knowles and Richard Smith (house concerts by Suzette). Much of this camp was about the style of Chet Atkins and Tommy Emmanuel. While I love this type of guitar playing, I did not find it suitable for myself as I was a complete novice with that style, and I have yet to pursue it. Lodging: Resort rooms.

Root and Boots was held outside of Flagstaff in 2023, way up high on a mountain. A nice cool escape from Tucson, I met some nice people and played jams in the evening. This was a nice mixture of genres which also included bluegrass. Classes were held among the cool pines, with some nice hiking nearby. 
